

State Burden

NPAO:

- In 2007, 59% of adults in California were overweight or obese based on self-reported height and weight.
- 71% of adults in California consumed fewer than 5 fruits and vegetables per day.
- 50% of adults in California were not engaged in moderate or vigorous physical activity.

Diabetes:

- 7,697 of adults in California died from diabetes mellitus in 2005.
- In 2007, 8% of adults in California reported being diagnosed with non-pregnancy related diabetes.

Heart Disease:

- Heart disease accounted for 27% of deaths in California in 2005, while stroke caused 7% of deaths.
- In 2007, 25% of adults in California reported having high blood pressure (hypertension) and 35% of those screened reported having high blood cholesterol, which puts them at greater risk for developing heart disease and stroke.

Program Impact:

- Negative - This is a loss of 889778 in overall federal funds for chronic disease prevention for the state health department between SFY12-13 and SFY13-14; added to a decrease in state funds for the state health department, it results in a loss of 7 positions overall. Less clinical services, surveillance/epidemiology, health education, environmental strategy change, health care system and clinical community linkages will be performed. Given California's population, the amount of money last year was suboptimal; now, the level and intensity of services will be reduced for all Californians
- Negative - 7 diabetes contract staff in the state health department were laid off, a loss of experienced, knowledgeable public health workers

- Negative - 1-3 heart disease contract staff to be laid off or have their time decreased in the coming months, a loss of experienced, knowledgeable public health workers
- Positive - New smaller more efficient coordinated state chronic disease program infrastructure with less administrative burden due to fewer grants and contracts
- Negative - Obesity staff to be redirected to other funded programs in the state health department, with loss of experienced, knowledgeable public health workers for CDC funded work
