

State Burden

NPAO:

- In 2007, 59% of adults in Connecticut were overweight or obese and 13% of high schools students were overweight, based on self-reported height and weight.
 - 79% of high school students and 72% of adults in Connecticut consumed fewer than 5 fruits and vegetables per day.
 - 48% of adults in Connecticut were not engaged in sufficient moderate or vigorous physical activity.

Diabetes:

- 811 adults in Connecticut died from diabetes mellitus in 2005.
 - In 2007, 6% of adults in Connecticut reported being diagnosed with non-pregnancy related diabetes.

Heart Disease:

- Heart disease accounted for 26% of deaths in Connecticut in 2005, while stroke caused 5% of deaths.
 - In 2007, 26% of adults in Connecticut reported having high blood pressure (hypertension) and 38% of those screened reported having high blood cholesterol, which puts them at greater risk for developing heart disease and stroke.

Program Impact:

- Positive - Funding will allow preserving of HDSP Coordinator and hire of a Clinical Policy and Outreach Coordinator to outreach to clinical practices and work on Domain 3 and 4 strategies. Funding offers ability to hire administrative support to work on Domain 3 and 4 activities
- Positive - Funding will allow preserving of DPCP Coordinator and hire of Clinical Policy and Outreach Coordinator to work on enhancing referral systems to community-based programs
- Positive - Funding will allow hire of a State nutrition and physical activity coordinator to work on Domain 2 strategies, including coordination with State Dept of Education (NPAO)
- School Health - Impact unknown at this time. Contractual line item was reduced substantially from our initial request in the enhanced budget, it is unlikely school health could be funded at previously funded levels
