## State Burden

### NPAO:

- In 2007, 62% of adults in Florida were overweight or obese and 15% of high school students were overweight, based on self-reported height and weight.
- 78% of high school students and 74% of adults in Florida consumed fewer than 5 fruits and vegetables per day.
- 62% of Florida high school students did not attend physical education classes.
- 53% of adults in Florida were not engaged in sufficient moderate or vigorous physical activity.

### Diabetes:

- 5,193 adults in Florida died from diabetes mellitus in 2005.
- In 2007, 8% of adults in Florida reported having been diagnosed with non-pregnancy related diabetes.

### Heart Disease:

- Heart disease accounted for 27% of deaths in Florida in 2005, while stroke caused 5% of deaths.
- In 2007, 28% of adults in Florida reported having high blood pressure (hypertension) and 37% of those screened reported having high blood cholesterol, which puts them at greater risk for developing heart disease and stroke.

## Program Impact:

- Negative -The lower than expected award for the Enhanced component is the key negative impact for our Bureau of Chronic Disease Prevention. It will be very difficult for our bureau to maintain existing staffing levels and we may not hire vacancies. Not hiring vacancies places us at risk for losing those FTEs
- Negative -No general revenue is allotted for our chronic disease work in Florida; the CDC funds are the driving force. Our Bureau of Chronic Disease Prevention MUST get increased funds in the Enhanced component as soon as possible and for years 2-5

- Negative -The Basic award for Florida is less than half of what the categorical diabetes and heart disease and stroke programs previously received. The Enhanced award is less than half of what we proposed. While we are grateful for these dollars, it will be difficult to maintain staff and act in an impactful way on the work plans. We will lose momentum and in a state this size, our previous successes are threatened
