

State Burden

NPAO:

- 65% of adults in Louisiana were overweight or obese in 2007 (using self-reported height and weight).
 - 80% of adults in Louisiana consumed fewer than 5 fruits and vegetables per day.
 - 61% of adults in Louisiana were not engaged in adequate moderate or vigorous physical activity.

Diabetes:

- 1,695 adults in Louisiana died from diabetes mellitus in 2005
 - In 2007, 10% of adults in Louisiana reported being diagnosed with non-pregnancy related diabetes.

Heart Disease:

- Heart disease accounted for 25% of deaths in Louisiana in 2005, while stroke caused 6% of deaths.
 - In 2007, 32% of adults in Louisiana reported having high blood pressure (hypertension) and 34% of those screened reported having high blood cholesterol, which puts them at greater risk for developing heart disease and stroke.

Program Impact:

- Positive - Able to address obesity (previously unfunded) and better able to coordinate efforts among disease categories with consolidated funding
- Positive - Supports the capacity building efforts of the Coordinated Chronic Disease Award
- Negative - Previously, we only received funding from the heart disease/stroke and diabetes awards, both at the capacity-building level. While the amount of SPHA funding is slightly more than our previous heart and diabetes awards combined, it is not enough to adequately address the additional physical activity, nutrition, obesity and school health performance measures. In addition, while SPHA was not meant to replace the Coordinated Chronic Disease Award that ends in March 2014, it will have to absorb some of these costs

- Negative - Not enough funding for statewide reach
- Negative - While no layoff notices have been sent, we are currently in the planning stages of reorganization of the team, which could not result in minimal layoffs or repositioning staff in different roles
