


Administrative Supports Identified for CBOs to Access Reimbursement

- CDC Recognition and Maintenance
- Billing, Reimbursement and Claims
- Data Management and Reporting
- Contracting and Insurance Verification
- Referral Sources

- Regulatory and Compliance Support
- MDPP Supplier Application Support
- Medicaid Enrollment (where available)
- Commercial and Employer Payment Access





Umbrella Hub Terminology

Umbrella Hub Organizations - sponsoring hub for a group of organizations (subsidiaries) that have CDC pending, preliminary, or full recognition.

Ultimately the UHO holds the recognition status for the entire arrangement. Provides administrative and business support to subsidiary organizations.

Community Based Organizations (CBOs) - broad term for organizations delivering the National DPP lifestyle change program.

Can include Federally Qualified Health Centers, Area Agencies on Aging, pharmacies, tribes, local health departments, faith-based organizations, extension programs, small social service agencies, and/or other small health care providers.

Subsidiaries (Affiliates) - CBOs delivering the National DPP lifestyle change program in their communities.

Umbrella Hub Arrangements (UHA) - Overarching term that refers to the entire group, inclusive of the UHO, subsidiaries, and the billing platform.



Pursuing a Sustainable Business Model



Phase I

Grant or other funding to start the umbrella hub arrangement



Phase II

Combination of grant funding and reimbursement from healthcare providers



Phase III

Umbrella hub arrangement operates on healthcare reimbursement from a diverse payer mix – may include Medicare and Medicaid, Commercial
