





South Dakota Food and Nutrition Security State Profile

Overview

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service (USDA ERS), 11.2% of households in South Dakota (S.D.) experienced food insecurity between 2018-2020. The prevalence of obesity among adults living in SD was 33.2% in 2020, as reported by the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS).

Demographic Overview

2019 U.S. Census data reports South Dakota has an estimated population of 884,659. They identify as white (84.6%), Black (2.3%), American Indian and Alaska Native (9.0%), Asian (1.5%), Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander (0.1%) only. According to the 2019 Census report, 4.2% identify as Hispanic or Latino. In 2019, 11.9% of South Dakota residents experienced poverty.
