



Colorado Food and Nutrition Security State Profile

Overview

According to the <u>U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service (USDA</u> <u>ERS)</u>, 10.1% of households in Colorado (CO) experienced food insecurity between 2018-2020. The prevalence of obesity among adults living in Colorado was 24.2% in 2020 as reported by Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS).

Demographic Overview

2019 U.S. Census data reports Colorado has an estimated population of 5.75 million. They identify as White (86.9%), Black (4.6%), American Indian and Alaska Native (1.6%), Asian (3.5%), Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander (0.2%) only. According to the 2019 Census report, 21.8% identify as Hispanic or Latino. 9.3% of Colorado residents experienced poverty in 2019.

 - Operates Share our Strength's <u>Cooking Matters</u> at the Store program.
- Weld Food Bank
 - Operates <u>mobile food pantries</u>, Kids Cafe, backpack programs, summer food service programs, mobile pantries, school pantries, and CSFP.
