



Illinois Food and Nutrition Security State Profile

Overview

According to the <u>U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service (USDA</u> <u>ERS)</u>, 9.2% of households in Illinois (IL) experienced food insecurity between 2018-2020. The prevalence of obesity among adults living in Illinois was 32.4% in 2020 as reported by the <u>Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS)</u>.

Demographic Overview

2019 U.S. Census data reports Illinois has an estimated population of 12.67 million. They identify as White (76.8%), Black (14.6%), American Indian and Alaska Native (0.6%), Asian (5.9%), Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander (0.1%) only. According to the 2019 Census report, 17.5% identify as Hispanic or Latino. 11.5% of Illinois residents experienced poverty in 2019.

Building Resilient Inclusive Communities (BRIC) - IL BRIC Communities

The following counties will be prioritized by the IL BRIC project: St. Clair County, Southern Seven (Alexander and Pulaski), and Peoria County.

Food Banks, Pantries and Feeding Programs

There are seven food banks that serve Illinois. <u>Feeding Illinois</u> is the state association that serves Illinois.

- St. Louis Area FoodBank
 - Serves St. Clair County.
 - Transitional Housing Program: when low-income St. Louis-area families move from temporary housing to a home of their own, the food bank supplies them with 250 to 300 pounds of food and household items to help them get a fresh start.
 - Provides fresh produce through <u>mobile markets</u> such as Food on the Move, Food Fairs, and Mobile Markets.
 - The food bank also operates CSFP for seniors, emergency food boxes (TEFAP), summer food service sites (SFSP), and partners with <u>pantries</u> across their service area.
- Tri-State Food Bank
 - Serves Alexander and Pulaski Counties.

 - Operates backpack programs, SNAP application assistance, and CSFP.

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- Eastern Illinois Food Bank
 - Serves Peoria County.
 - View a list of partner agencies.
 - Operates mobile distribution school and collegiate pantries, veteran food pantries, and SNAP application assistance.
- Central Illinois Foodbank
 - Operates Kids Cafe, Summer Food Service Program, and a retail store donation program.
- Northern Illinois Food Bank
 - Operates the Summer Food Service Program, SNAP application assistance, mobile pantries, senior food boxes, and an online food pantry.
 - Provides nutrition and cooking education.

- Greater Chicago Food Depository
 - Provides job training, SNAP application assistance, veterans food pantries, school pantries, Kids Cafe, Summer Food Service Program, and older adults community markets.
 - Provides nutrition education and has nutrition policies for donations.

- <u>Riverbend Food Bank</u>
 - Operates a backpack program, school pantry program, senior produce boxes, senior pantry programs, SNAP application assistance, and mobile food pantries.
