





New York State Food and Nutrition Security State Profile

Overview

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service (USDA ERS), 10.5% of households in New York (NY) experienced food insecurity between 2018-2020. The prevalence of obesity among adults living in New York was 26.3% in 2020 as reported by the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS).

Demographic Overview

2019 U.S. Census data reports New York has an estimated population of 19.45 million. They identify as White (69.6%), Black (17.6%), American Indian and Alaska Native (1%), Asian (9%), Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander (0.1%) only. According to the 2019 Census report, 19.3% identify as Hispanic or Latino. 13% of New York residents experienced poverty in 2019.
