

The ability to maintain public health programming and its benefits over time



# Why clinical sustainability tools are necessary

- Shift from policies and programs to practices and procedures
- Integration with other clinical practice activities
- High reliance on clinical and frontline staff
- Less reliant on external partners
- More reliant on technical supports
- Positive outcomes are important and can be seen sooner

## Why sustainability tools are necessary

- Sustainable implementation helps ensure maximal benefit of evidence-based interventions long term
- Critical for cancer control
  - 1. Cancer will continue to be a public health issue
  - 2. Best use of investments in resource limited settings
  - 3. Continued trust in health system

The ability of an organization to maintain structured clinical care practices over time and to evolve and adapt these practices in response to new information







### **Program Sustainability Assessment Tool**







### Setting the stage for your plan...

- » Identify your team:
  people who can bring about change, invested partners
- » Define program elements: program purpose, long-term goals, target population
- » Review sustainability assessment results: strengths, barriers to sustainability, opportunities



### **Key sustainability plan components**

- Sustainability domain/area of focus
- SMART objective
- Action steps
  - Responsible individuals
  - Resources needed (e.g., meeting space, software)
  - Outcomes (i.e., what does success for each step look like?)
  - Timeline (i.e., due dates)
